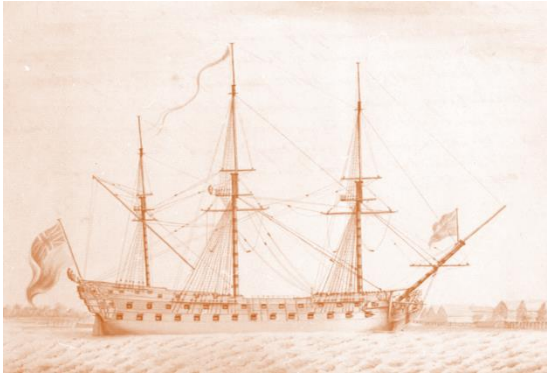


# The Five Houses of Cams Hill School

In 2018 CHS decided to introduce a house system. The four house names were decided as: Invincible, Endeavour, Illustrious and Warrior. In 2023 a new fifth house will be added, with the new purple house being called Victory. Owing to the location of the school near Portsmouth – the site of Britain’s biggest naval base, as well as the high number of pupils who are in military families, the house names were taken from names of Royal Navy Ships.



## HMS Invincible (1747)

*“Invincible was originally a 74-gun ship of the line of the French Navy launched in October 1744. Captured on 14 May 1747, she was taken into Royal Navy service as the third-rate HMS Invincible. She was wrecked in 1758 after hitting a sandbank. The wreck is a Protected Wreck managed by Historic England.”*

## HMS Endeavour (1768)

*“HMS Endeavour was a British Royal Navy research vessel that Lieutenant James Cook commanded to Tahiti, New Zealand and Australia on his first voyage of discovery from 1768 to 1771.”*



## HMS Illustrious (1940)

*“HMS Illustrious was the lead ship of her class of aircraft carriers built for the Royal Navy before World War II. Her first assignment after completion and working up was with the Mediterranean Fleet, in which her aircraft's most notable achievement was sinking one Italian battleship and badly damaging two others during the Battle of Taranto in late 1940.”*



## HMS Warrior (1861)

*“HMS Warrior is a 40-gun steam-powered armoured frigate built for the Royal Navy in 1859–1861. She was the name ship of the Warrior-class ironclads. Warrior and her sister ship HMS Black Prince were the first armour-plated, iron-hulled warships, and were built in response to France's launching in 1859 of the first ocean-going ironclad warship, the wooden-hulled Gloire.”*



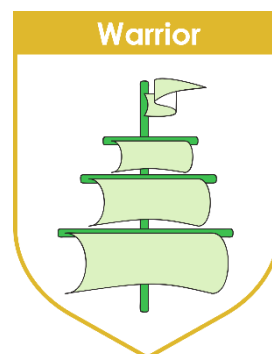
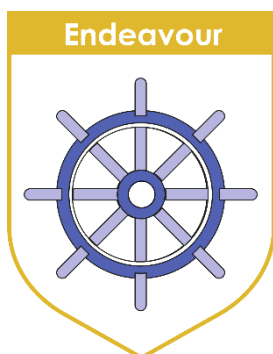
## HMS Victory (1778)

*“HMS Victory is a 104-gun first-rate ship of the line of the Royal Navy. Victory is best known for her role as Lord Nelson's flagship at the Battle of Trafalgar on 21 October 1805. After 1824, she was relegated to the role of harbour ship. With 245 years of service as of 2023, she is the world's oldest naval vessel still in commission.”*



## Our First Four House Logos

In 2018 Cams Hill School pupils were asked to design the logos as part of a competition. The winning designs were made into the four house logos we have today:



### Logo Design Winners 2018

The final four logos were created from the designs of the top five entries. There were over a hundred entries, and these were shortlisted to 40 top designs. The top designs were then judged by the Headteacher, members of SLT, the PE Department and the Art Department. The designs shown below were selected as winners, as aspects of each design helped create the final logos.

This design was chosen for our Invincible logo. The judges liked the simple link of an anchor to The Royal Navy.

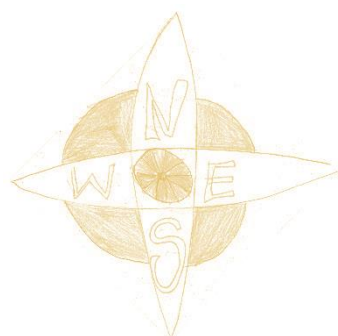
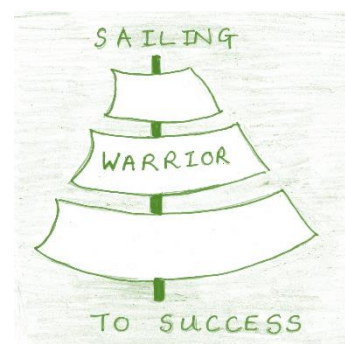


Design by Jessica F Yr10  
A part of Jessica's design was used in the Invincible logo. The judges felt it was important to incorporate the rope into at least one of the logos.

Paul's design caught the attention of the judges for its simplicity and use of one colour. This meant it could be easily drawn by pupils when supporting their house.

This design and its slogan, also by Paul, was unique as it helped the judges develop a theme for the logos: momentum and journey. This reflected a pupil's journey through secondary school.

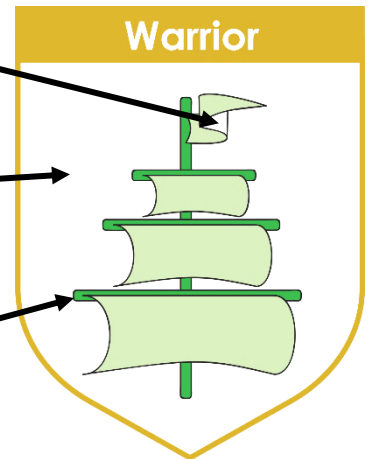
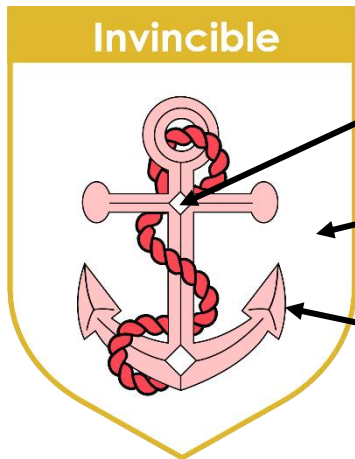
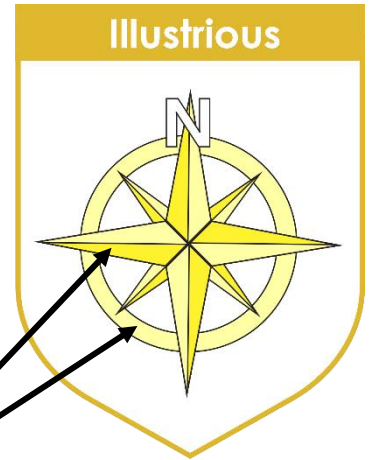
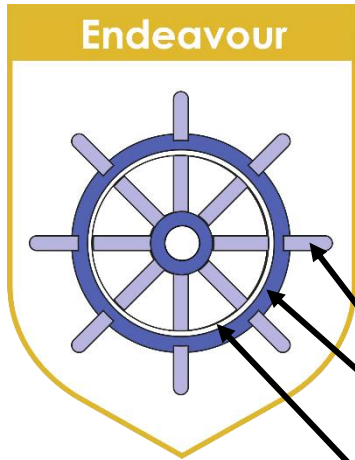


Design by Zac G Yr7  
This design by Zac was the only entry out of all the designs which incorporated a compass. The clear link between the theme and direction caught the eye of the judges.

# Designing The Victory House Logo

With the current house logos designs in mind, it is now your turn to create the fifth logo. Here are a few things to think about when creating your design.



The design must follow the same design format as the current four.

This includes:

Follow the theme of naval boats. Our logos reflect the theme of historic boats and features aspects related to them: a ships wheel, a compass, an anchor and ship sails. What other features/aspects can you think of which will make a good logo?

The use of two shades of purple. The current logos use both a bold colour and a pale colour in the logo. Try and create a design which also does this.

Include an area of white.

Keep the background of the design blank. The current logos can be placed on different background colours and objects, such as: clothing and made into stencils.

Give the logo a black outline. This enables the design to be printed clearly in various formats such as black and white for colouring in.

Here are a few key words to think about, while designing your logo:
